Stakeholders are engaged in ongoing conversations regarding student engagement and re-engagement of students. Parents, teachers, and students have the opportunity to engage in planning through parent meetings like coffee with the principal and family nights. Parents, students, and teachers are also invited to attend meetings for the School Site Counsel, ELAC, MTSS, and PTO.

A description of how students will be identified and the needs of students will be assessed.

Students needs are identified by different data sets.

Middle school students are selected for summer school based on their academic performance throughout the school year. Student services team meets with students and parents to ensure students are making academic progress throughout the school year. Students who have not made sufficient academic progress must participate in summer school enrichment activities including the topics of English and math.

High school students are selected to participate in summer school credit recovery based on previously failed courses. Student services staff review graduation plans with students and plan credit recovery enrollment to ensure students are back on track to graduate.

Throughout the school year, the MTSS team and student services team review data on a weekly basis. This data is used to assign Academic Coaches to students in the academic tiers 2 and 3. Academic Coaches work with students who are failing coursework in recovering missing assignments and supporting students re-engage in the classroom environment.

The MTSS and student services team also review attendance data. Counselors can re-engage students with the learning community and provide an academic coach to ease reengagement.

Student needs are also assessed through benchmark assessment (i-ready math and English). These benchmarks provide a snapshot to where students skills are at and provides goals for the rest of the semester. Teachers work with students to understand their current scores and the goals for the rest of the school year.

Throughout the school year, high school students will be given the opportunity to complete credit recovery courses outside of their scheduled coursework.

Enrichment will occur throughout the summer and after school. This includes a CTE Bootcamp that will allow students to participate CTE exploration projects on the current offered pathways.

Students services will outreach to students and parents with supplemental instruction and support opportunities. Supplemental instruction opportunities will also be advertised through advisory, social media, and bulletins.

A description of the LEA's plan to provide supplemental instruction and support.

Supplemental instruction and support will occur during the summer. Middle school students will receive English and math instruction during the summer by grade level and based on their English and math benchmarks.

Supplemental instruction for high school will be on EdGenuity. They will have the opportunity to recovery failed courses to regain credit for graduation. EdGenuity provides A-G approved the curriculum based on the failed coursework.

Supplemental support during the 2021-2022 school will be provided by paraprofessionals and academic coaches to students struggling with their current coursework. Students failing coursework will have the opportunity to work with their coach to understand their assignments and create a plan for improvement.

Credit recovery will also be available during the 2021-2022 school year for students to make up.

The Charter School is carefully monitoring all state and local funds to ensure they are monitored and used effectively. The Charter School is attempting to simplify the process by using all ELO Grant funds exclusively on extending instructional learning time and providing additional student supports. The Charter School is tracking expenditures within the budget. We are currently tracking all funds to ensure they are tracked appropriately under the following areas:

State Funds: General Fund; Supplemental and Concentration Grant; ELO Grant; In-Person Grant.

Federal Funds: LLM GEER; LLM CRF; LLM GF; ESSER I; ESSER II; ESSER III.

Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan Instructions: Introduction

The Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan must be completed by school districts, county offices of education, or charter schools, collectively referred to as Local Educational Agencies (LEAs), that receive Expanded Learning Opportunities (ELO) Grant funds under California *Education Code (EC)* Section 43521(b). The plan must be adopted by the local governing board or body of the LEA at a public meeting on or before June 1, 2021, and must be submitted to the county office of education, the California Department of Education, or the chartering authority within five days of adoption, as applicable. Instructions: Plan Requirements

An LEA receiving ELO Grant funds under *EC* Section 43521(b) is required to implement a learning recovery program that, at a minimum, provides supplemental instruction, support for social and emotional well-being, and, to the maximum extent permissible under the guidelines of the United States Department of Agriculture, meals and snacks to, at a minimum, students who are included in one or more of the following groups:

- low-income,
- English learners,
- foster youth,
- homeless students,
- students with disabilities,
- students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation,
- disengaged students, and
- students who are below grade level, including, but not limited to, those who did not enroll in kindergarten in the 2020–21 school year, credit-deficient students, high school students at risk of not graduating, and other students identified by certificated staff.

For purposes of this requirement

- “Supplemental instruction” means the instructional programs provided in addition to and complementary to the LEAs regular instructional programs, including services provided in accordance with an individualized education program (IEP).
- “Support” means interventions provided as a supplement to those regularly provided by the LEA, including services provided in accordance with an IEP, that are designed to meet students’ needs for behavioral, social, emotional, and other integrated student supports, in order to enable students to engage in, and benefit from, the supplemental instruction being provided.
- “Students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation” means students who are identified as being at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation in a written referral from a legal, medical, or social service agency, or emergency shelter.

EC Section 43522(b) identifies the seven supplemental instruction and support strategies listed below as the strategies that may be supported with ELO Grant funds and requires the LEA to use the funding only for any of these purposes. LEAs are not required to implement each supplemental instruction and support strategy; rather LEAs are to work collaboratively with their community partners to identify the

supplemental instruction and support strategies that will be implemented. LEAs are encouraged to engage, plan, and collaborate on program operation with community partners and expanded learning programs, and to leverage existing behavioral health partnerships and Medi-Cal billing options in the design and implementation of the supplemental instruction and support strategies being provided (*EC* Section 43522[h]).

The seven supplemental instruction and support strategies are:

1. Extending instructional learning time in addition to what is required for the school year by increasing the number of instructional days or minutes provided during the school year, providing summer school or intersessional instructional programs, or taking any other action that increases the amount of instructional time or services provided to students based on their learning needs.
2. Accelerating progress to close learning gaps through the implementation, expansion, or enhancement of learning supports including, but not limited to, any of the following:
 - a. Tutoring or other one-on-one or small group learning supports provided by certificated or classified staff.
 - b. Learning recovery programs and materials designed to accelerate student academic proficiency or English language proficiency, or both.
 - c. Educator training, for both certificated and classified staff, in accelerated learning strategies and effectively addressing learning gaps, including training in facilitating quality and engaging learning opportunities for all students.
3. Integrated student supports to address other barriers to learning, such as the provision of health, counseling, or mental health services, access to school meal programs, before and after school programs, or programs to address student trauma and social-emotional learning, or referrals for support for family or student needs.
4. Community learning hubs that provide students with access to technology, high-speed internet, and other academic supports.
5. Supports for credit deficient students to complete graduation or grade promotion requirements and to increase or improve students' college eligibility.
6. Additional academic services for students, such as diagnostic, progress monitoring, and benchmark assessments of student learning.
7. Training for school staff on strategies, including trauma-informed practices, to engage students and families in addressing students' social-emotional health needs and academic needs.

As a reminder, *EC* Section 43522(g) requires that all services delivered to students with disabilities be delivered in accordance with an applicable IEP.

Fiscal Requirements

The following fiscal requirements are requirements of the ELO grant, but they are not addressed in this plan. Adherence to these requirements will be monitored through the annual audit process.

- The LEA must use at least 85 percent (85%) of its apportionment for expenditures related to providing in-person services in any of the seven purposes described above.
- The LEA must use at least 10 percent (10%) of the funding that is received based on LCFF entitlement to hire paraprofessionals to provide supplemental instruction and support through the duration of this program, with a priority for full-time paraprofessionals. The supplemental instruction and support provided by the paraprofessionals must be prioritized for English learners and students with disabilities. Funds expended to hire paraprofessionals count towards the LEAs requirement to spend at least 85% of its apportionment to provide in-person services.

- An LEA may use up to 15 percent (15%) of its apportionment to increase or improve services for students participating in distance learning or to support activities intended to prepare the LEA for in-person instruction, before in-person instructional services are offered.
